How do I become a Master Gardener?

To become a Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) master gardener you must complete a 45-hour (10 weeks) CCE Master Gardener Volunteer Training course in general horticulture. The cost for the training is \$125 and after completing 100 hours of service CCEFM will refund \$25 of the cost.

The 2014 training at the CCE in Saratoga County office in Ballston Spa will include Basic Plant Pathology, Soils & Fertilizers, Garden Botany, Annuals & Perennials, Basic Entomology, Organic Gardening & Composting, Vegetable Gardening, Fruits, Trees & Shrubs, Pruning, Ecological Lawn Care, Nuisance Wildlife, & Herbs.

After completing training, volunteers are expected to attend monthly Master Gardener meetings and complete 100 hours of volunteer Master Gardener service within two years.

What does a Master Gardener do?

Activities and efforts implemented by Master Gardeners are based on the educational priorities of individual counties varying somewhat by county. Master Gardeners may:

- *Research & answer questions
 - *Write articles about gardening
 - *Participate in demonstration projects
 - *Speak on local radio programs
 - *Advise school gardeners
 - *Consult with community gardens
 - *Staff information tables at farmers' markets
 - *Teach workshops & classes
 - *Help historic garden restoration efforts
 - *Help with community improvement projects
 - *Horticultural therapy
 - *Organize plant sales & public horticultural events
- *Staff county fair informational booths
- *Advise customers at garden centers
- *Increase awareness of integrated pest management (IPM), water quality conservation & environmental issues

What do I need to be a Master Gardener?

*A basic interest and knowledge about landscape and food gardening



- *Enthusiasm for acquiring and sharing horticultural knowledge and skills
- *Interest in teaching people of all ages
- *Written & verbal communication skills



- *Willingness to volunteer time on horticultural projects and functions to help meet the goals of the Cornell Cooperative Extension program
- *Understanding of Cornell Cooperative Extension's educational mission
