<u>4-H Member Re-enrollments Were Due December 1. Do We Have Yours?</u>

The annual CCEFM 4-H member enrollment fee is \$20.00 per year with a cap of \$50.00 per family unit (3 or more youth residing at the same location). **Payment of the 4-H enrollment fee is the responsibility of the family** and must be paid directly to Cornell Cooperative Extension. The enrollment fee form is due at the time of enrollment.

Re-enrollment forms and fees were due on or before December 1, 2013. An individual reenrollment submitted after December 1st must include a \$10.00 late fee. A family unit reenrollment submitted after December 1st must include a \$15.00 late fee. You are not a current 4-H member nor are you covered by 4-H insurance until the forms and fee are submitted to CCEFM. Prompt return of these required forms will ensure you will continue to receive uninterrupted 4-H communications. Thanks for your help.

Lewis County 4-H Teen Winter Weekend, Friday February 14 (6-8 p.m. Arrival/Registration/Snacks) through Sunday February 16 (lunch)

Enrolled 4-Hers ages 13 to 19 (as of January 1) are invited to join other 4-H teens from across New York at this weekend of indoor hands-on workshops, winter sports, ice breakers and fun at the Oswegatchie Educational Center at 9340 Long Pond Road in Croghan, New York.! Outside activities may include cross country skiing, snow sculpture, ice skating, snowshoeing and a night hike! Lewis County 4-H Teen Ambassadors are working on the planning of the program and workshops focusing on the theme of the '80s. It costs \$70.00 per participant. This covers lodging, meals (Saturday breakfast to Sunday lunch) as well as snacks and most workshop supplies.

VIP approved 4-H adult chaperones are also needed to accompany teens from Fulton and Montgomery Counties and provide transportation at the fee of \$70.00 each. Volunteers/chaperones will be required to help with meals and supervise kitchen clean-up.

<u>Winter Regional 4-H Shooting Sports Training, February 21, 22 & 23 at the Saratoga County</u> <u>4-H Training Center in Ballston Spa, New York 12020</u>

The New York, Maine, New Hampshire, New Jersey and Vermont 4-H Shooting sports Programs' Annual winter workshop will certify adult volunteer leaders as 4-H Shooting Sports instructors. The workshop will feature the following disciplines (based on a minimum enrollment of five participants): Air Pistol, Archery, Coordinator, Living History, Muzzle Loading, Rifle and Shotgun. Adults will be certified to teach the applicable discipline to youth participating in formal 4-H shooting sports programs and camp situations. Each state maintains its own standards for certification that may exceed those established by the National 4-H Shooting sports curriculum standards.

Especially critical at this time is the role of the VIPP (Volunteer Involvement Policy and Procedure) guidelines adhered to by CCE. No one should be attending this training that has not completed and submitted the required applications, passed a background check, and had his/her references checked by CCEFM staff. CCEFM is responsible for the completion of these procedures for any volunteer residing in Fulton and Montgomery Counties.

The registration fee per 4-H volunteer is \$85.00 which includes materials and meals. Lodging is on your own; however, because Fulton and Montgomery Counties are so close to the training location, participants can probably commute to the training activities from home. Any individual interested in participating in this training must submit his/her paperwork and \$85.00 registration fee to the CCEFM 4-H Office in Canajoharie on or before Wednesday, February 12.

Please note two changes in the format of the training in regards to Living History and Coordinator. The Living History curriculum is now broken into two components: Level 1 is geared toward a program directed to general 4-H members and focuses on activities and projects while Level 2 is geared toward those who are more interested in developing a complete persona with their youth. This is a much more in-depth activity and may not be suited to a general 4-H audience. If you've completed Living History in the past, you DON'T need to repeat.

Coordinator/STEM is geared toward educators, key volunteers, and club leaders. The Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) curriculum takes a step beyond developing safe shooting skills for the range and applies safe scientific analysis to shooting sports. The program will use activities outlined by Colorado State University as well as some activities developed here in NYS.

Why 4-H Shooting Sports? The need for the 4-H Shooting Sports Program is more important today than ever. 4-H volunteers, members and families learn and are able to make sound decisions based on knowledge and hands on learning – the 4-H way. Remember the following 4-H Shooting Sports tenet: Youth Development is the primary goal of the 4-H Shooting Sports program. Introducing safe use of firearms & archery equipment opens up the opportunity for valuable vocational and recreational life-long learning. By combining demonstration, lecture and hands-on activities, 4-H Shooting Sports youth participants build self-confidence and

develop life skills. Societal issues are best addressed through education with 4-H Shooting Sports providing unbiased information based on the National 4-H curriculum.

Jennifer Freeman 4-H Memorial Scholarships – Applications Due April 30th

Applications are now available for the Jennifer Freeman 4-H Memorial Scholarships sponsored by 4-H private support funds. Two scholarships (each \$300.00) are awarded annually to encourage 4-H members to pursue formal education beyond the high school level. Major emphasis is given to a candidate's 4-H experiences and achievements including the influence 4-H has had on the individual's career and educational goals. The scholarship may be used for any legitimate higher education purpose. Eligibility requirements are as follows:

- 1. Candidate must be a current or former 4-H member who will be enrolling as a freshman at an accredited college, university, junior college, community college, technical or trade school in the fall of 2014. This includes 2 and 4-year education programs in any field.
- 2. Candidate must have been a 4-H member for at least 3 years with at least the most recent 4-H membership in the Fulton/Montgomery 4-H program.

Please request an application from the 4-H office by calling 673-5525 ext. 113 or 114 or e-mailing <u>lew9@cornell.edu</u>. **Completed forms are due to the 4-H office in Canajoharie no later than April 30, 2014.** Scholarship recipients will be selected at the May meeting of the 4-H Youth Development Committee. If at all possible, awards will be made directly to the individual recipients at scholastic awards ceremonies or graduation.



4-H Dairy Judging Barn Meeting – January 4, 2014 at 1:00 p.m.

The first 4-H Dairy Judging Barn Meeting for this 4-H program year will begin at Roedale Farms in Richfield Springs. After judging there, participants will travel to Ovaltop Farm nearby to judge and round out the day. Barn meetings will be led by 4-H resource volunteer James Canary. Go 2.5 miles then turn left onto McShane Road. #626 is on the left. Those attending will receive directions to Ovaltop when the get to Roedale.

<u>County Level Horse Bowl - January 11, 2014, 9:00 – 11:00 a.m. at the Shirley Luck Senior</u> <u>Citizens Center in Johnstown, New York</u>

The 4-H Horse Bowl Season will begin with an opportunity to test your knowledge about horses and possibly be selected to represent Fulton and Montgomery Counties at the Regional Horse Bowl Contest in Voorheesville on March 22nd. Novice, Junior, and Senior Teams will be selected on this date. Note: Novice Division is for youth ages 8-13 (as of January 1, 2014) who

have competed 2 years or less as a Novice. Junior Division is for youth ages 9-13 (as of January 1, 2014). Senior Division is for youth ages 14-19 (as of January 1, 2014).

Pheasant Chicks Available Again for 4-H Rear and Release Projects

The Day-Old Pheasant Chick Program provides a great educational experience involving aspects of wildlife management and ecology to broaden the environmental awareness of 4-H youth ages 9-19. Day-old pheasant chicks are provided free from the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to qualified enrolled 4-H youth applicants.

4-H members must have or are willing to provide a brooding facility, a covered outdoor rearing pen, appropriate food, water, and other needs for approximately 8-10 weeks until the birds are released into the wild. Daily care is necessary to monitor the health of the birds and ensure there is adequate feed and water for the rapidly growing chicks. The pheasants may be released when they are eight weeks old or older and no later than the end of the pheasant-hunting season, which varies for different regions of New York State. All release sites must be open for public hunting and the number of pheasants released is recorded at the end of the project.

The Day-Old Pheasant Chick Program began in the early 1900s. At that time, pheasant eggs and chicks were distributed to farmers and rural youth.

Cooperative ventures between local sportsman's clubs and 4-H youth are encouraged.

The rearing and release of pheasants requires a great deal of responsibility by 4-H youth and a substantial time commitment.

Why raise pheasants?

- Rearing pheasants is enjoyable, challenging and teaches youth responsible behavior.
- Released pheasants offer fall hunting opportunities.
- People enjoy seeing and hearing pheasants.

To become involved and receive more information, please call the 4-H office at 673-5525, ext. 114 as soon as possible. Forms sent to you for completion must be returned to the 4-H office no later than Thursday, March 13. We must let the DEC Reynolds Game Farm know the quantity of chicks needed by Fulton/Montgomery 4-Hers by March 15th. All pheasant chicks will be hatched and delivered from the game farm in Ithaca, New York to the CCEFM Office in Canajoharie in early May.
